Besides the foregoing Vessels, there are a number of Revenue Cutters, and about 178 Gun Boats, a few of which are on the Lakes. There are two Block vessels in the Delaware, and a number of Gallies are building for harbour defence.

The laws for increasing the Navy, authorize the building of one ship of 74 guns, and three Frigates of 44 guns each, in addition to those already on the stocks.

Vessels marked thus [*] are hired by the United States; O, denotes vessels in ordinary; C, in commission; B, building; T, taken from the enemy.

BRITISH VESSELS OF WAR, TAKEN OR DESTROYED, 1812.

Whiting, sch. 4 guns, Lieut. Maxey, taken at anchor in Hampton Roads, July 8th, by the privateer *Dash* of 1 gun. She was boarded without resistance, having just arrived, and her commander not knowing of the war.

Alert, 20 guns, T. L. P. Laugharne, taken August 13, by the *Essex*, Captain Porter, after an engagement of eight minutes. The action was commenced by the *Alert*, which, when she struck, had seven feet of water in the hold, was much cut to pieces, and had three men wounded. The *Essex* did not receive the slightest injury.

Guerriere, J. R. Dacres, rating 38 and mounting 49 guns, captured by the *Constitution*, Captain Hull, on the 19th of August, in latitude $41^{\circ} 42'$ North, and longitude $55^{\circ} 33'$ West, after a severe action of thirty minutes, within pistol shot distance. The *Guerriere* was completely dismasted, and so entirely disabled, that she was burnt by order of Captain Hull, as soon as the prisoners were removed. *Guerriere*, 15 killed, 61 wounded, 24 missing; *Constitution* 7 killed, 7 wounded.

Detroit, 6 guns and 56 men, taken October 9, on Lake Erie. The *Detroit* (late *Adams*) and the brig *Caledonia* were anchored under the protection of the guns of the British fort Erie, and were there attacked and carried in ten minutes by Lieutenant Elliot, with about 100 men, in two boats. The *Detroit* was burnt, and the *Caledonia* with prisoners brought off, after two unsuc-

cessful attempts, by a detachment of British troops, to retake them.

Caledonia, brig, 2 guns, October 9th.

Frolic, brig, Captain Whinniates, taken October 18th. Recaptured, (*See American losses.*)

Macedonian, J. S. Carden, rating 38 and mounting 49 guns, taken by the United States, Captain Decatur, on the 25th of October, in latitude 29° North, and longitude 29° 30' West, after an action of an hour and a half, during which the mizen mast of the *Macedonian* was shot away, and her spars and rigging so cut to pieces, that she was rendered a perfect wreck. The British ship was to windward and kept at long shot. *Macedonian*, 36 killed, 68 wounded; United States, 5 killed, 7 wounded. The damage sustained by the American frigate was very trifling.

Java, H. Lambert, rating 38 and mounting 49 guns, manned by upwards of 400 men, captured on the 29th of December, in latitude 13° South, longitude 38° West, by the *Constitution*, Captain Bainbridge, after an action of one hour and fifty-five minutes, including a suspension of three quarters of an hour. Every mast and spar being shot away and the ship a complete wreck, she was burnt. *Java*, 60 killed, (including the Captain,) and 101 wounded; *Constitution* 9 killed, 25 wounded.

1813.

Peacock, brig, W. Peake, rating 18 and mounting 20 guns, taken on the 24th of February, off Demerara, by the *Hornet*, Captain Lawrence, after a severe action of fifteen minutes. Before all the prisoners could be removed from the *Peacock*, she sunk, carrying down thirteen of her crew, and 3 of the *Hornet's* men. *Peacock*,

Captain and a number of men killed, and sunk with the vessel, and 33 wounded. *Hornet*, 1 killed, 2 slightly wounded.

Fox, tender, 2 brass guns, captured April 13, in Long-Island Sound, by the small sloop *Hero*, manned by volunteers out of Stonington, Connecticut. She was commanded by the 4th Lieutenant of the *Ramelies* 74.

Duke of Gloucester, brig, 12 guns, taken at York, Lake Ontario, at the capture of that place by our naval and military forces, April 27th. A *Ship* on the stocks and nearly completed was burnt at the same time.

Eagle, tender, 1 brass 32 lb. howitzer, captured off Sandy Hook, July 4th, by volunteers, from the flotilla in New-York harbour, in a fishing-smack, under the command of Sailing-master Percival. The commanding officer of the tender was killed, a midshipman mortally and 2 men badly wounded.

Dominica, brig, G. W. Barrette, rated 10 and mounting 16 guns, taken by the *Decatur* privateer of 7 guns, by boarding, after an action of more than an hour, during which the British packet ship *Princess Charlotte* remained a silent spectator of the scene. *Dominica*, 13 killed, 47 wounded ; *Decatur*, 3 killed, 16 wounded.

Boxer, G. Blyth, 14 guns, taken on the 6th of September, near Portland, (Mass.) by the *Enterprise* brig, 12 guns, Lieutenant Burrows, after an action of forty-five minutes. The *Boxer* was much cut to pieces. The American brig received but little injury in her hull or rigging. *Boxer*, Commander and — men killed, and 17 wounded ; *Enterprise*, 2 killed, 12 wounded, including the Commander, (since dead.)

Besides the above, seven British packets and several transport vessels have been captured by

our public and private armed ships, since the commencement of the present war.

AMERICAN PUBLIC VESSELS,

LOST, TAKEN, OR DESTROYED, 1812.

Nautilus, brig, William M. Crane, 12 guns, taken by the Shannon frigate, July 16th, after a long chase.

Com. Barry, sch, 6 guns, (revenue cutter,) captured in the bay of Fundy, August 3d. by the Maidstone frigate.

Adams, armed brig, (afterwards Detroit, retaken and destroyed) included in the surrender of Detroit, August 16th.

James Madison, sch. 12 guns, (revenue cutter,) taken August 22d, by the Barbadoes frigate, after a chase of seven hours.

Wasp, Jacob Jones, 16 guns, taken October 18th, in latitude 37° North, longitude 65° West, by the Poitiers 74, Captain Beresford. The *Wasp* had captured, after a desperate action of forty-three minutes, the sloop of war Frolic, mounting four guns more than the *Wasp*, and before damages could be repaired, both vessels were taken possession of by the 74. Frolic, 30 killed, 50 wounded. *Wasp*, 5 killed, 5 wounded.

Vixen, brig, G. W. Reed, 12 guns, taken by the Southampton frigate, November 22d. The brig and frigate were both lost shortly after on the Island of Conception.

1813.

Viper, brig, J. D. Henley, 12 guns, taken by the Narcissus frigate, January 27th.

Chesapeake, James Lawrence, 36 guns, taken in Massachusetts Bay June 1st, by the Shannon frigate, by boarding, after a desperate action, in which Captain Lawrence and his first Lieutenant were mortally wounded; the fourth Lieutenant, Lieutenant of Marines, Sailing-master and three Midshipmen were killed, and all the surviving Lieutenants, as well as several Midshipmen severely wounded. *Chesapeake*, 47 killed, 98 wounded. *Shannon*, 26 killed, 58 wounded.

Growler, sch. 10 guns, } taken June 3, in a nar-
Eagle, sch. 12 guns, } row channel on lake
Champlain, after a long conflict with a squadron of Gun boats, assisted by artillery on shore.

Asp, sch. Sailing-master Sigourney, taken in the river Potomac, July 14th, by five boats, containing fifty men each. The *Asp* had previously repulsed three boats, and in the renewed attack, the schooner was carried, and her gallant Commander and several of her crew slain.

Gun boat No. 121, W. Shead, Sailing-master, taken in the Delaware, July 27th, by the boats of the *Junon* frigate and *Martin* sloop of war, after a sharp contest, in which she had 7 men wounded. She was afterwards dismantled by the enemy and drifted ashore a wreck.

Hamilton, sch. Lieut. Winter, 9 guns, and *Scourge*, sch. 8 guns, Sailing-master Osgood, upset in a squall, August 7th, while the American was pursuing the British squadron on lake Ontario. All on board excepting 16 men perished.

Growler, sch. Lieut. Mix, 5 guns, and *Julia*, sch. 3 guns, Sailing-master Trant, captured on lake Ontario, August 10th, by Sir J. L. Yeo's squadron, after being separated from the American command by a sudden change of weather.

A Gun-boat, conveying 15 batteaux laden with military and other stores, taken July 19, by a privateer on Lake Champlain.

The whole British Squadron on Lake Erie, commanded by Com. Barclay, captured by the American Squadron under Com. Oliver H. Perry, after a desperate conflict, in which the British force was greatly superior. American loss, 27 killed, 96 wounded. British loss, 70 killed, including several officers, and about the same number wounded.

Schooners Julia and Growler, with three other schooners, taken October 5th, on Lake Ontario, by the ship General Pike, and schooner Sylph. These vessels were transporting troops. Prisoners taken, 308. A sloop and gun-boat were in company; the former was burnt by the enemy, and the latter run on shore. The *Julia and Growler* were formerly American—See p. 13.

The number of British Government Packets taken is *twelve*, viz: *Prince Adolphus*, by the Governor *McKean* privateer; *Princess Amelia*, by the *Rossie* privateer; *Swallow*, by the *President* frigate; *Townsend*, by the *Tom* privateer, ransomed; *Norton*, by the *Essex* frigate, recap-

tured; *Express*, by the *Anaconda* privateer, ransomed; *Mary Ann*, by the *Teazer* privateer; *Ann*, by the *Young Teazer* privateer; *Duke of Montrose*, by the *President* frigate, sent to England with prisoners; *Manchester*, by the *Yorktown* privateer, retaken; *Fox*, by the *Fox* privateer, retaken and sunk; *Morgiana*, by the *Saratoga*, privateer.

AMERICAN PUBLIC VESSELS

LOST, TAKEN, OR DESTROYED,—1813.

Argus, brig, William H. Allen, 16 guns, taken August 14th, in St. George's channel, by the Sloop of war *Pelican*, J. F. Maples, 18 guns, by boarding, after an action of 45 minutes. Capt. Allen died of wounds received in the action. The American official account of the engagement has not been received.

Gun-boats, No. 62 and No. 164, sunk in the St. Mary's, in a severe gale, Sept. 12, and 20 men perished. Several other Gun-boats were driven on shore in the same gale but are expected to be got off.

MEMORANDA.

The frigate *Essex*, Capt. Porter, sailed on a cruise October 18, 1812. The last intelligence of her, was received through a Jamaica paper, which states that she had been cruising in the Pacific Ocean, anchored at Lima on the 5th of April, had made many prizes, and then had on board four or five millions of dollars in specie.

The frigate *Congress*, Capt. Smith, sailed from the outer harbour of Boston, in company with

the *President*, April 30, 1813. The last accounts of her were received through English papers, in which it was stated that she had made several captures on the Brazil coast.

The *President* frigate, Com. Rodgers; arrived at Newport September 26, after a cruise of 150 days; during which she took twelve sail of British vessels—among them were a government packet, and a tender to Admiral Warren. Saw no other government vessels, except a 74 with a frigate in company, which chased him ninety hours. The *President* had been into the North Sea, &c.

The *Argus* previous to her capture had taken twenty-one sail of British merchantmen, most of which she destroyed.

The *Constellation*, having been found unfit for immediate service, is to be taken into dock for repairs. Captain Gordon and crew are to be transferred to one of the frigates building.

The brig *Rattlesnake*, Captain Creighton, and brig *Interpretse*, Lieut. Renshaw, are cruising on the Eastern coast.

The *Frolic*, fitting at Boston, and the *Wasp*, fitting at Newburyport, are expected to be ready for sea during the ensuing month. The *Peacock*, at New-York, has a full crew recruited, and is nearly ready for sea.

The U. S. Revenue Cutter *Vigilant*, Captain Cahoone, captured and brought into Newport, on the 7th of October, the British privateer schooner *Dart*, 6 guns and 20 men. The Cutter was mostly manned by volunteers from the Flotilla at Newport. The first Lieutenant of the *Dart* was killed.

Two large *Row-Gallies* have recently been launched at Burlington, on Lake Champlain.

PROMOTION.

Oliver H. Perry, commander of the squadron on Lake Erie, has been promoted to the rank of Captain.

OBITUARY.

List of Officers in the United States Navy, deceased during the present War.

CAPTAIN.

James Lawrence, commander of the Chesapeake frigate, died June 5, of wounds received in the action with the *Shannon*, on the first of that month.

MASTERS COMMANDANT.

George W. Reed, late commander of the brig *Vixen*, died at the Island of Bermuda, December 1812.

William H. Allen, commander of the brig *Argus*, died at Plymouth, England, August 15th, 1813, of wounds received in the action with the *Pelican*, on the 14th of the same month.

LIEUTENANTS COMMANDANT.

Walter Winter, commander of the schooner *Hamilton*, drowned August 7th, 1813, on Lake Ontario, by the upsetting of that vessel.

William Burrows, commander of the brig *Enterprise*, killed September 6, 1813, in the action with the brig *Boxer*. He survived his wound just long enough to see the flag of his adversary struck.

LIEUTENANTS.

John Mercer Funk, of the frigate *United States*, killed October 25, 1812, in the action with the *Macedonian*.

William C. Aylwin, of the frigate *Constitution*, killed Dec 29, 1812, in the action with the *Java*.

Edward J. Ballard, acting Lieutenant of the frigate *Chesapeake*, killed June 1, 1813, in the action with the *Shannon*.

Octavius Augustus Page, late 1st of the *Chesapeake*, died at Boston June 4th, 1813, of a lung fever.

Augustus C. Ludlow, 1st of the frigate *Chesapeake*, died at Halifax June 13th, of wounds received in the action with the *Shannon*.

William S. Bush, 1st Lieutenant commanding marines on board the *Constitution* frigate, killed Aug. 19, 1812, in the action with the *Guerriere*.

James M. Broome, 1st Lieutenant commanding marines on board the *Chesapeake* frigate, killed June 1, 1813, in the action with the *Shannon*.

John Brooks, 1st Lieutenant commanding marines on board the *Lawrence*, killed September 10, 1813, in the engagement between the American and British fleets on Lake Erie.

— *Arundel*, commanding sch. *Pert* on Lake Ontario. He was wounded November 10, 1812, under the batteries of Kingston, and refusing to quit the deck of his vessel, was, shortly after, accidentally knocked overboard and drowned.

FRENCH SHIPS OF WAR,

TAKEN OR DESTROYED, 1812.

Rivoli, 80 guns, and *Mercury* 20, (blown up,) Taken in the Gulf of Venice by the *Victorious*, 74, Capt. Talbot, and the *Weazle*, 18, J. W. Andrew, after a severe action of four hours. The *Victorious* had 42 killed, and about 98 wounded; the *Rivoli* had about 400 killed and wounded.—February 22.

Ariane 44, *Andromache* 44, and *Mameluke* 18 guns, burnt and destroyed at the entrance of L'Orient, by the *Northumberland* 74, Captain Hotham, and *Growler*, gun brig, J. Weeks, after a most gallant action.

Le Cerf, 10 guns, taken by the *Phipps*, 14, Capt. T. Wells, off Dover.

Le Bon Genie, 14 guns, taken by the *Dwarf*, 10, Lieut. G. Gordon, off Boulogne.

L'Eole, 14 guns, taken off Heligoland, by the boats of the *Britomart*, *Osprey*, and *Leveret*, under the direction of Lieut. William Malone, the 16th July.

L'Intrepide, 18 guns, taken by the *Richmond*, 14, D. E. Bartholomew, after a smart action.

AMERICAN,—1812.

James Madison, 14 guns, taken, after a chase of seven hours, by the *Barbadoes*, Capt. T. Huskisson, August 22.

Wash, 18 guns, taken by the *Poictiers*, 74, Capt. J. P. Beresford.

Nautilus, 16 guns, taken by the *Shannon*, Capt. Broke, (now the *Emulous*.)

Vixen, captured by the *Southampton*, 32, Sir J. L. Yeo, but afterwards lost on a reef of rocks, near Conception Island, Bahamas.

1813.

Viper, brig, 12 guns, taken by the *Narcissus*, 32, Captain John R. Lumley.

BRITISH SHIPS,

LOST, TAKEN, OR DESTROYED.—1812.

Ephra, brig, T. Everard, 10 guns, built 1808, lost on the Porpoises, near Cadiz, crew saved.—January.

Laurel, S. C. Rowley, 38 guns, taken 1807; lost on the Groives Rocks, in the Taigneuse Passage. Crew saved, but 172 made prisoners.

Manilla, John Joyce, 36 guns, built 1807, lost on the Haak Sands, Texel. Crew, excepting twelve, saved.

Fly, brig, Henry Higman, 18 guns, built 1806, struck on the Knobber Reef, on the east point of the Island of Anholt, crew saved.

Plumper, Lieut. J. Bray, 12 guns, built 1807, totally lost in a violent gale of wind in the Bay of Funday. Part of the crew saved.

Skylark, James Boxer, 16 guns, built 1806, destroyed near Boulogne. Crew saved.

Exertion, Lieut. Murray, 12 guns, built 1805, lost by getting aground in the River Elbe, and afterwards destroyed by the boats of that ship. July 8.

Encounter, brig, Lieut. J. H. Talbot, 14 guns, built 1805, taken in an attempt to cut out some vessels at St. Lucar, after a very severe action.

Chubb, Lieut. Samuel Nisbett, 4 guns, built 1808, lost near Halifax, with all her crew.

Alert, T. L. P. Laugharne, 16 guns, built 1804, taken on the coast of North America, after a most gallant action, by the American frigate *Essex*, of 44 guns.

Emulous, W. H. Mulcaster, 18 guns, built 1805, lost on Sable Island. Crew saved.

Attack, brig, Lieut. R. W. Simmonds, 14 guns built 1804, taken in a calm, off Anholt, after a most determined and severe action, by a squadron of Danish gun-boats.

Laura, Lt. C. N. Hunter, 10 guns, built 1805, taken by the *Diligent*, French privateer, on the coast of North America, after a most gallant resistance; the *Diligent* previously captured H.M. schooner *Whiting*, Lieut. Maxey, of 4 guns, with dispatches for England.

Apelles, 14 guns, built 1808, run on shore near Boulogne, in company with the *Skylark*, but afterwards recaptured by the *Bermuda*, *Phipps*, *Castilion* and *Rinaldo*, under a severe fire from the batteries for 3 hours.

Guerriere, J. R. Dacres, 38 guns, taken 1806; taken by the *Constitution*, American frigate, of 50 guns and 476 men, commanded by Cap. Hull, after a most obstinate and determined resistance. The *Guerriere* had only a complement of 244 men at quarters, and fought under the most disadvantageous circumstances, and was afterwards obliged to be destroyed.

Nimble, cutter, Lt. Reynolds, built 1811, foundered in a gale, off the Island of Salo, in the Kattegat. Crew saved.

Barbadoes, Thomas Huskisson, 28 guns, built 1803, struck on the North West bar of Sable Island, and lost. Crew saved, excepting one man.

Centinel, gun-brig, Lieut. W. King, 14 guns, built 1804, lost on the Shoals, off the Island of Rugen, near the Great Belt. Crew saved.

Belette, brig, David Sloan, 18 guns, built 1806, lost on the rocks, off the Island of Lessoe, (in the Kattegat) and all the officers and crew perished, except five men.

Alban, cutter, Lt. W. S. Key, 10 guns, totally wrecked near Aldborough, and the whole of the crew, except one man and one woman, perished.

Macedonian, J. S. Carden, 38 guns, built 1810, taken off Madeira by the American frigate *United States*, Commodore Decatur, of 54 guns and 478 men, after a most determined and severe action, highly honourable to Captain Carden and his brave crew, 104 of which were either killed or wounded.

Avenger, Henry Johnstone, 16 guns, built 1804, lost going into St. John's, Newfoundland. Crew saved.

Magnet, F. M. Maurice, 10 guns, built 1809, supposed to have foundered on her passage to Halifax, with all her crew.

Java, Henry Lambert, 38 guns, taken December 29, off the Coast of Brazil, by the *Constitution*, American frigate, of 50 guns, and afterwards destroyed, after a most determined and desperate resistance of upwards of three hours and a half; in which time she was made a complete wreck, having her bowsprit and every mast and spar shot out of her. *Java*, 24 killed, 100 wounded; *Constitution*, 14 killed, 44 wounded, the number slightly wounded could not be ascertained.

1813.

Subtle, schooner, Lt. C. Brown, 10 guns, built 1807, Upset off St. Bartholomew's, in the West

Indies, when in chase of the *Jack's Favourite*, American privateer. Crew perished.

Ferret, F. A. Halliday, 18 guns, built 1806, lost near Leith. Crew saved.

Southampton, Sir James Lucas Yeo, *Knt.* 32 guns, built 1755, struck on a reef of rocks near Conception Island, in the Crooked Island Passage, Bahamas, and totally lost.—Crew saved. The *Southampton* had previously captured the United States brig *Vixen*, of 14 guns and 130 men, which also shared a similar fate.

Sarpedon, Thomas Parker, 10 guns, built 1808, supposed lost, being missing since Decr. 1812.

Linnet, brig, Lieut. J. Tracy, 14 guns, built 1806, taken by the *Gloire*, French frigate, 44 guns, near the Madeiras.

Daring, gun brig, Lieut. W. R. Pascoe, built 1804, destroyed on the 7th of February, by its crew, to prevent her falling into the hands of the enemy.

Captain, (rs) 74 guns, built 1787, burnt in Hamoaze, on the night of the 22d of March.

Rhodian, John Boss, 10 guns, built 1808, lost on her passage to Jamaica. Crew saved.

Peacock, William Peake, 18 guns, built 1807, taken off Demerara by the American sloop of war *Hornet*, 24 guns, Captain Lawrence, after a severe action of forty-five minutes, and afterwards sunk.
