# PERSONNEL AND SHIPS' DATA BARBARY WARS

#### PREFACE

This Register of officers and ships of the Navy during the years 1801 through 1807 will supplement the operational material in Naval Documents related to the United States Wars with the Barbary Powers, six volumes of which have already been published. The additional data on personnel and ships should be of value not only to historians but also to geneologists, artists, model builders, and naval architects.

Part I, Personnel, endeavors to list all the commissioned, warrant, and acting officers both of the Navy and Marine Corps during the years 1801 through 1807, stating the various duty assignments of each. All the material is from official sources, but there may be omissions because of incomplete records and failure to report some changes of duty and appointments at distant stations. The Office of Naval Records and Library will be glad to have these drawn to its attention. The initials P. E. A. mean Peace Establishment Act; and ran means deserted.

Part I has been prepared by Mrs. Alma R. Lawrence. She was assisted by Miss Loretta I. MacCrindle, Mrs. Fay A. King, Miss Mabel I. Welde, Miss Catherine MacDonnell, Mrs. Frances M. Holmes, and Miss Georgia Freese.

Part II, Ships' Data, has been compiled from many sources, all contemporary and authentic, but much about our early naval vessels was not known even in the Navy Department when the vessels were still in existence. Additional material will be welcomed by the Office

of Naval Records and Library.

The form in which the data are presented requires definitions for those headings not self-explanatory. Cost is the total expenditure made to prepare the vessel for duty, unless otherwise noted. Agent is the individual or firm who handled the business details for the Navy Department. The builder had actual charge of constructing the In Commission is the earliest date when the vessel is known to have been fully prepared for duty. Principal dimensions: great care has been taken to attain uniformity so that an accurate basis of size comparison is possible. Unless noted by specific wording or by an asterisk length means that of the gun deck from the fore part of the rabbit of the stem to the after part of the wing transom; breadth denotes the extreme width at the widest point including both wales; depth is the measurement from the limber strake to the top of the deck Since the method of calculating tonnage varied widely in different ports it has been impossible to attain any uniformity. Complement: because of frequent changes in the size of ships' crews these figures must be considered the number of men required to work and fight a given vessel. Battery: this gives the number and size of the guns in the main battery but does not include light pieces such as swivels and top howitzers. Spar dimensions: since the masting and sparring of vessels was left largely to the preferences of commanding

officers, changes were made constantly. The sizes listed are those in actual use in the year noted. The lengths given are whole lengths with mast heads and yard arms included. Diameters are omitted as masts generally followed a rule of 1 inch to 3 feet of length and yards 1 inch to about every 5 feet. Light spars such as studdingsail yards and booms are not listed because of space limitations. The tabulation of gunboats is the first known to appear in print. There are much data missing from the Navy Archives about these vessels and much found there are contradictory but all data presented have

been carefully sifted and are believed to be accurate.

The plans of vessels reproduced in this volume are all taken from originals in the National Archives or Library of Congress. The photographs for the plates were the work of Lt. Kenneth L. Morton AUS and Mr. John J. Keegan, both formerly members of the staff of the Division of Photographic Archives and Research, National Archives. It is only through their skill in reproducing these badly stained and in some instances mutilated drawings that it has been possible to present facsimiles of these plans. Mutilations are indicated by a wavy line. This office is also greatly indebted to Dr. Vernon D. Tate, Dr. W. Neil Franklin, and Mr. Charles L. Perry, Jr., of the National Archives for their aid in expediting the photographic work.

Served in Norfolk and President during Quasi-War with France; in President, New York, Chesapeake, Argus, and Enterprize in the Mediterranean, 1801-1805; in command of Sicilian Gunboat No. 5 in attack on Tripoli August 3, 1804; participated in expedition for destruction of Philadelphia, February 16, 1804. In command of Gunboat No. 11 and Etna, New Orleans Station, 1806-1807.

Bainbridge, William.

Lieutenant, August 3, 1798. Master Commandant, March 29, 1799. Captain, May 20, 1800. Ballard, Henry E.

Midshipman, April 2, 1804. Served in President and Siren in the Mediterranean, 1804-1806; Wasp on cruise Europe, 1807. Ballard, William.

Midshipman, March 2, 1803. Lieutenant, March 28, 1807. Served in Vixen and President in the Mediterranean, 1803-1805; officer in, and in command of Gunboat No. 1 on Charleston Station, 1805-1806; New Orleans Station, 1806-1807.

Midshipman, April 30, 1798. Lieutenant, June 1, 1799. Served in the United States and Patapsco during Quasi-War with France. Had no service in the Mediterranean. Resignation accepted February 17, 1802. Bardin, Levi.

United States and in command of Warren and President during the Quasi-War with France; in command of President, New York, Chesapeake, Essex, and President in the Mediterranean, 1801-1805; in charge of gunboat construction in Mathews County, Virginia, 1806; in command of the Chesapeake in home waters, 1807.

Barron, Samuel.

Captain, September 13, 1798. In command of Richmond. Baltimore, Constellation, and Chesapeake during the Quasi-War with France; Philadelphia in the Mediterranean, 1801-1802; in command of Mediterranean Squadron with President, Essex, and Constitution, respectively, as flagships from September 10, 1804, to May 22, 1805. perintended construction of gunboats at Hampton and Beard, William C. Norfolk, Va., 1805-1807.

Barry, John.

Captain, June 4, 1794. Commanded U. S. S. United States\_during the Quasi-War with France. Died September 13, 1803.

Barry (Berry), William.

Appointed boatswain May 7, 1804, and ordered to Essex. No record found of service in Essex. Warrant sent October 14, 1805, to date from February 2, 1802. U. S. S. Enterprize in the Mediterranean, 1802-1803; returned home in Chesapeake, May, 1803; Washington Navy Yard, 1803 and 1805; brig Hornet in home waters, 1805-1806; merchant service, 1806-1807; New York Station, 1807.

Barrymore, Joseph Henry.

Acting midshipman in Gunboat No. 2 in the Mediterranean from May 1, 1805, to August 26, 1806. Midshipman, August 16, 1806. Merchant service, 1806-1807; Gunboat No. 8, New York Station, July-December, 1807. Bayard, Anthony W. W.

Appointed midshipman August 5, 1805. Served on board the U. S. S. Adams in home waters. Dismissed October 30, 1805. Beale, Thomas T.

Midshipman, February 17, 1800. Served in U.S.S. Chesapeake during the Quasi-War with France. Furloughed for 12 months, November 12, 1801. Resignation accepted June 9, 1803.

Beall, John H.

Surgeon's mate, April 28, 1804. Served in Congress and Constellation in the Mediterranean, 1804-1805; furloughed December 2, 1805; Norfolk Station, 1807. Resignation accepted October 15, 1807.

Midshipman, July 4, 1805. Served in U. S. brig Hornet and Gunboat No. 1 in home waters, 1805-1806; merchant service, 1806-1807.

Bedford, Joseph.

Midshipman, April 2, 1804. Served in U. S. S. Congress in home waters. Resignation accepted July 1, 1804.

Acting gunner in gunboat service at Norfolk late in 1807.

Midshipman, January 3, 1800. Lieutenant, February 5, 1807. Served in Chesapeake during Quasi-War with France: President, John Adams, and Congress in the Mediterranean, 1801-1805; merchant service, 1806-1807.

Benson, Charles.

Midshipman, February 21, 1802. Served in U. S. S. Adams in Mediterranean. 1802-1803; sent home in Chesapeake, May, 1803. Cashiered June 6, 1803.

Bentley, Peter E.

Midshipman, April 12, 1800. Served in Congress Chesapeake during the Quasi-War with France; retained for service in Chesapeake. Resignation accepted March 4, 1802.

Benton (Benson), Thomas.

Acting sailmaker in U. S. S. John Adams in the Mediterranean, May 1804 to February 1805.

Biddle, Clement, Jr.

Midshipman, February 12, 1800. Served in U. S. S. Philadelphia during Quasi-War with France; Philadelphia in the Mediterranean, 1801 – 1802 ordered to Siren June 4, 1803 but was on shore sick when

she sailed. Went to Medi-Blake, Philemon C. terranean to join her but resigned December 17, 1803, at Gibraltar.

Midshipman, February 12, 1800. Lieutenant, May 18, 1804. Served in U. S. S. President Quasi-War during France; in Constellation and Philadelphia in the Mediterranean, 1802-1803; captured with the Philadelphia, October 31, 1803; released and returned home in the President, September, 1805; in command of Gunboat No. 1, Charleston Station, 1805-1806; Philadelphia Station, 1806; merchant service, 1807. Blaine, Ephraim R.

Midshipman, March 17, 1800. Served in Ganges during the Quasi-War with France: Constellation and Essex in the Mediterranean, 1801-1804. Broken by Court Martial November 15, 1804, and discharged.

Blake, Joshua.

Midshipman, April 6, 1799. Lieutenant, July 4, 1800. General Greene Served in and Experiment in Quasi-War with France; George Washington, Philadelphia, Argus, Constitution, and Essex in the Blount, Richard B. Mediterranean, 1800-1806: commanded Sicilian Gunboat No. 3 in attack on Tripoli, August 3, 1804.

Blodget, Samuel Gilman. Midshipman, June 24, 1799. Lieutenant, March 17, 1807. Served in Ganges and Constitution during the Quasi-War with France; Constellation, Argus, sloop Hornet, Constitution in the Mediterranean. 1802-1806; came home in Essex, July, 1806; gunboat service at Newport, Middletown and New York, 1807.

Blount, Joseph.

Boyd, James.

Surgeon's mate, October 19, 1799. Surgeon, July 1, 1803. Served in Augusta and Experiment during the Quasi-War with France: U. S. S. Adams in the Mediterranean, 1802-1803; at Gibraltar sick, October 1, 1803; died.

Boyd, Joseph.

Served as steward in the Chesapeake and Enterprize in 1803-1804; promoted to clerk, September 20, 1804, in the Enterprize. Discharged at Syracuse, May 7, 1807.

Boyd, Walter.

Midshipman, August 4, 1800. Served in United States and Experiment during the Quasi-War with France; Enterprize, John Adams, and prize Gunboat No. 9 in the Mediterranean, 1803-1806. In charge of Gunboat No. 52, New York Station, 1807-1808.

Bradford, James H.

's mate, August 23, Served in U. S. S. Surgeon's mate, 1800. Boston during Quasi-War with France; Boston in the Brooke, Samuel B. Mediterranean, 1801-1802. Resignation accepted July 15, 1803.

Bradford, William.

Acting midshipman in the U. S. S. Enterprize in the

Mediterranean from January 3 to July 31, 1807. Warranted July 24, 1807. In command of Gunboat No. 32, New York Station, 1807.

Brandt, Richard B.

Midshipman, August 3, 1798. Sailing master, May 16, 1800. Served in Richmond and Ganges during the Quasi-War with France; Constellation in the Mediterranean and in ordinary at Washington Navy Yard, 1801-1803. Resignation accepted March 22, 1804.

Brent, Alexander.

Midshipman, April 2, 1804. Served in Essex and sloop Hornet in the Mediterranean, Died at Syra-1804–1805. cuse about August 20, 1805.

Brereton, Thomas. Midshipman, June 20, 1806. Merchant service, 1806–1808.

Britton, Thomas.

Acting carpenter in U. S. bomb ketch Vengeance in the Mediterranean from June 4, 1805 to August 7, 1806.

Master's mate in U. S. S. John Adams. Detached April 6, 1803. Supernumerary on board Chesapeake to June 7, 1803.

Surgeon's mate, August 1807. Ordered to New York Station.

Brown. Matthew.

Carpenter, April 14, 1800. Served in U. S. S. Philadelphia during Quasi-War with France; Philadelphia in the Mediterranean and in ordinary at Washington Navy Yard, 1801-1803. No further record found.

Brown, Thomas.

Midshipman, April 27, 1801. Lieutenant, March 27, 1807. Served in George Washington during Quasi-War with France; Philadelphia in the Mediterranean, 1801–1802; Siren at Philadelphia, May to August, 1803; Constitution, Siren, and sloop Hornet in Mediterranean, 1804-1806; merchant service, 1806- Buskin, Conrad. 1807; in command of Gunboat No. 54, New York Station, August 1807 to April 1808.

Acting boatswain in U. S. S. Argus in the Mediterranean from August 20, 1805 to July 17, 1806.

Midshipman, November 22, 1805. On furlough for merchant voyage, 1806-1808.

Bullus, John.

Surgeon's mate, March 9, 1798. Surgeon, July 20, 1799. Served in United States and Insurgente during the Quasi-War with France; Washington Navy Yard, 1801 to February 1807; visit to Europe; returned home in Revenge, December 13, 1807.

Bunker, William.

Served as boatswain in Gunboat No. 5 and U. S. S. Siren in Mediterranean, the 1806.

Acting boatswain in U. S. S. Congress in ordinary at Washington Navy Yard, November 1802.

Burns, James.

Portsmouth during Quasi-War with France; in Philadelphia in Mediterranean, 1801–1802; in charge of United States in ordinary at Washington, 1802; in Constitution, Vixen, Siren, and Essex in the Mediterranean, 1803-1806, and in Vixen and Constitution in Mediterranean again 1806-1807.

C., 1806; in Wasp on cruise to Europe, 1807.

Master's mate April 23, 1805. Served in U.S. Gunboat No. 4 in the Mediterranean to September 1, 1805, when he was detached and became secretary to Colonel Tobias Lear at Algiers. Considered out of service from that date.

Henry, John B.

Midshipman October 30, 1804. to rank from April 2, 1804. (Entered service May 4, 1804, as a captain's clerk), served in Constellation, Essex, and Constitution in the Mediterranean, 1804-1807.

Acting carpenter in U.S. bomb ketch Vesuvius on New Orleans Station from December 19, 1806 to June 4, 1807.

Higinbotham, James Sempill.

Midshipman, October 31, 1799. Lieutenant, April 20, 1807. Served in U. S. S. Patapsco during the Quasi-War with France; Essex, New York. John Adams, Enterprize, and Essex in the Mediterranean, 1801-1806; in command of Trabaccolo No. 1, June 24 to July 7, 1805.

Hill, William E.

Midshipman, June 28, 1804. Served in U. S. S. Adams in Holden, Thomas. waters, 1805–1806; Gunboat No. 68. Norfolk Station, 1807.

Hinton, Abijah John.

Midshipman, February 17, 1800. Served in U.S.S. Chesapeake during Quasi-War with France. Discharged January 12, 1802, under P. E. A.

Hipkins, Batran G.

Master, August 4, 1807. command of Gunboat No. 68 at Norfolk, August to December 1807.

Hipkins, Leroy.

Master, November 27, 1807, to date from August 4, 1807. In command of Gunboats Nos. 60 and 64 at Norfolk, November to December 1807.

Hite, Jacob.

Midshipman, April 2, 1804. Served in Constellation, Siren, and Gunboat No. 5 in the Mediterranean. 1804-1806; merchant service, 1806-1807; New York Station, 1807.

Hodge, George.

Boatswain, May 11, 1798. Served in Ganges and Philadelphia during the Quasi-War with France; Philadelphia in Mediterranean. 1801-1803; captured when foundered October 31, 1803; released and returned home in President, September 1805; Washington Navy Yard, 1805-1807. Hoffman Beekman V.

Midshipman, July 4, 1805. Served in U. S. brig Hornet in home waters and in the Mediterranean, 1805-1807.

Hogan (Hogen), Daniel.

Acting carpenter in Gunboat No. 10 at Norfolk, July to December 1807.

Holcombe, Samuel.

Acting midshipman in U. S. S. John Adams in the Mediter-

ranean from May 9, 1804 to February 1805.

Acting gunner in U.S.S. General Greene in ordinary at Washington Navv November 1802.

Holmes, William.

Midshipman, February 20, 1802. Served in U. S. S. Adams in the Mediterranean. Died off Gibraltar, September 21, 1802.

Holt. Peter.

Served as carpenter in U. S. S. Nautilus and sloop Hornet in the Mediterranean, 1805.

Hook, William.

Acting gunner in U.S.S. Enterprize in the Mediterranean from June to November 1801. Gunner, November 17, 1801. Served in Enterprize, in the Mediterranean, 1801-1804; participated in expedition for destruction of Philadelphia February 16, 1804. Came home in Gunboat No. 9, 1806. U. S. S. Chesapeake in home waters, 1807.

Hopkins, Stephen.

Acting boatswain from April 29, 1805. Served in Gunboat No. 10 in the Mediterranean, 1805-1806.

Hoyt, James.

Acting gunner in sloop Hornet in the Mediterranean, 1805.

Huie, James.

Sailing master, March 11, 1803. In command of U. S. S. President in ordinary. Discharged April 21, 1803.

Hull, Isaac.

Lieutenant, March 9, 1798. Master commandant, May 18, 1804. Captain, April 23, 1806. Served in U. S. S. Constitution during the Quasi-War with France; in the Mediterranean in the Adams and command of Enterprize and Argus, 1802-1806; participated in attack on Derne, April 1805; in charge of gun-
